SACRED CAVES

Caves in Zanzibar are revered as places of spirits and ancestors. Kuza Cave has been traditionally used for making wishes through ceremony and for healing rituals. Local people recognise this as a place that was used by their forefathers long before Islam and Christianity came to Africa. So please respect Kuza Cave as you would a European sacred space, like a church. Dip into the cool waters and explore the underwater sculptures. Feel free to make a wish of your own and meditate before the Elephant Alter in the middle of the cave.

Ancient humans spread from mainland Tanzania, where some of the oldest bipedal pre-human footprints are preserved in mud in the Rift Valley, to the East African coast and eventually the whole world. Come and seea timeline of huanan history and understand how the ancient Island port of Zanzibar has connected parts of Europe, Asia and the Middle East to nations in Africa for thousands of years.
